

Groundbreaking Set for August 17th Program will take place at Music in the Park

Thanks to the support and generosity of many people who are committed to preserving Seymour area heritage for future generations, the building fund has reached the point where it will cover the cost of the new building.

Additional funds are still needed to construct and maintain-eye catching exhibits that utilize modern technology. This edition of the *Seymour History Bulletin* describes the new building, lists all donors of \$100.00 or more, and explains how you can recognize your family or business for years to come.




Facts about the new Seymour Community Museum

- It is two stories tall, 60 feet wide and 70 feet deep. Because of the high water table, there is no basement.
- It is located on Depot Street in downtown Seymour between the present museum and the gazebo.
- The old museum will be converted to an old time country store with the second floor used for storage.
- The building will be staffed and maintained by volunteers who are members of the Seymour Community Historical Society.
- The cost of the building is \$890,000.00. This does not include exhibits and additional costs such as landscaping, security system, computers, etc.
- Private donors or in-kind contributors have provided all construction costs and exhibit expenses.
- The building fund as of August 2011 is \$1,025,000.00. An additional \$200,000.00 is needed to expand exhibits and additional expenses.
- All donors of \$100.00 or more will be recognized on the donor wall in the entryway.

Recognize Your Family, Loved Ones, a Business, a Location, a Club, a Team, or an Event, by Sponsoring an Exhibit, Display, or Picture.

As you look over the plans for the museum/learning center notice the variety of displays. This should give you a better idea of the sponsorships that are available. Everyone who donates \$2,500.00 or more has the opportunity to sponsor a picture, exhibit, or room. We will personally contact you to determine the brief message. Example: sponsored by the "John and Jane Smith Family," or "Courtesy of Acme Engineering." Another choice might be: "In memory of Mr. and Mrs. John Doe."

Numerous large pictures and display cases will be located throughout the building. Perhaps you would like to sponsor a rural scene (cheese factory), a business scene (bank or store), or a display case featuring items that are meaningful to you (possibly school or military items). We will work with you and do our best to honor your request.

Listed below are the various levels of giving and sponsorships available

- Donate \$100,000 to become a **Major Donor** and earn naming rights to a large room.
 - Example: The classroom/flex space on second floor.
- Donate \$50,000 \$99,999 to join the **Governor's Club** and naming rights to an office or room. Examples: The archive room, storage room, or three historical display rooms.
- Donate \$25,000 \$49,999 to join the **Senator's Club** and earn naming rights to a room or large display. Examples: The welcome video, historical society office, gift shop, two historical display rooms.
- Donate \$10,000 \$24,999 to become a **Trailblazer** and sponsor a small display room or large exhibit. Examples: The historic kitchen, historic doctor's office, fair exhibit, school exhibit, etc.
- Donate \$5,000 \$9,999 to become an **Explorer** and sponsor a large picture or smaller exhibit. Examples: A 3' x 6' 1907 picture of downtown Seymour, glass display tower, etc.
- Donate \$2,500 \$4,999 to become a **Pioneer** and sponsor a smaller picture or display case. Examples: An 18" x 24" picture or display space in a case.
- Donate \$1,000 \$2,499 to become a **Settler** and have your *name* listed on the plaque in the vestibule. Example: Your name or the person or business of your choice listed in bold letters under "Settler."
- Donate \$500.00 \$999 to become a **Scout** and have your name listed on the plaque in the vestibule. Example: Your name or the person or business of your choice listed under "Scout."
- Donate \$100.00 \$499 and you will be listed under **Additional Donors** on the plague.

The plan is for most of the exhibits to have a learning component that will make the display meaningful in a fun, dynamic manner. This, of course, adds additional expense, but pays educational dividends. We are grateful for your financial support. Please consider if you are in a position to increase your commitment or encourage others to donate to this community project. The enclosed yellow sheet details the number of options that are available to help guarantee the support of the museum/learning center through many generations.

Fashion Show a Huge Success

Close to 200 people enjoyed "**Stylin' with the Party Band: 1910-1960s,"** a step back in time as forty models, mostly students from Seymour High School, displayed period fashions, music, dancing, fun and frolic. The program featured clothing from the collection stored at the museum. Accompanied by music from the **Party Band** and Dale Johnson, the models strutted their stuff from 1910 to the 1960s. The staff at Doxbee's prepared a great meal and everyone had a good time.

A variety of pictures projected behind the models, portrayed street scenes of Seymour and its residents through the decades. Often the clothing of the model closely resembled the person in the picture. Of particular interest were military uniforms including one worn by Alvin Piehl in WWI.

SHS baseball players Troy Rottier and Alex Leisgang started the evening showing the contrast in baseball uniforms and equipment. Rottier filled out the hand-lettered uniform of Walter Ebert who pitched for Isaar in the 1920s. His diminutive glove was half the size of the modern basket displayed by Leisgang who was attired in a present day SHS uniform. As the evening progressed the audience viewed dress suits, wedding dresses, scout uniforms, a bowling shirt, "hot pants" a number of prom dresses and much more.

Seymour High School history teachers Dan Brice and Curt Jefson recruited the students to model the classic clothing from the collection of the historical society. Student participation in this project and their commitment of time and energy is a reflection of their interest in contributing to community activities and preserving our heritage.

The Seymour dance team, under the leadership of Terri Van Boxtel, contributed to the ambiance of the era by demonstrating the dance steps of each decade. The count was a fundraiser for the new museum.
