tickets at the advance price from a member of the Museum Board of Directors. Tickets are \$15.00 in advance and \$20.00 at the door. Children 12 and under are \$10.00. Any proceeds from raffles and ticket sales go toward the museum operating fund.

Audit and Annual Budget

Because of the large amount of money donated to finance the new museum in 2012, the state accounting office required an audit of the records of the historical society. We are pleased to report the Appleton accounting firm, Erickson and Associates, found the books to be well balanced. This is a tribute to our former treasurer Marge Coonen and her diligent bookkeeping. Because of this, our tax-exempt status was renewed and the society remains a 501 C-3 tax-exempt organization.

The museum is staffed by volunteers who contribute much of their time to be open five days a week during the summer and on Sundays in the off season. In the past year 3,668 people visited the museum. For the upcoming summer the museum Board is working on advertising to make the facility a tourist destination. Since it is desirable for the museum/learning center to be a vibrant place it is wise to change exhibits and host a variety of attractions. In order to do this the historical society relies on our membership for support. The city council considers the facility an attribute and pays the cost of utilities. All other expenses must be met by the society.

These figures are based on expenses and income from 2013. It is obvious a large amount of the income of the society is dependent on donations from the membership.

Highlights from the Annual Report for 2013

- The museum was open five days a week 1:00 to 4:00 through September. The building was also open for groups by appointment.
- From October through December, open hours were on Sundays from 1:00 to 4:00 and by appointment.
- The museum was closed January through March, but open by appointment.
- A wide variety of organizations toured the museum. These include the Rock Ledge fourth grade students, senior living residents, local clubs and organizations, class reunions, family gatherings and visiting historical societies.
- Burger Fest was a great opportunity to introduce visitors to the new facility. Over 1,700 guests toured the day of the festival.
- The Veteran's Exhibit attracted 340 visitors.
- The total number of visitors to the museum in 2013 was 3,668. Music in the Park continues to be a very popular attraction for city residents. The total attendance for the summer was **2,988**. Profit from the raffle and concession income was \$2,200.00.

- The gazebo was used regularly throughout the summer. Often when the gazebo is used for community events such as church service and assorted gatherings, the museum is open to provide clean restrooms for the participants.
- The Christmas display around the museum and in Nagel Park included 45 decorated trees. The trees were donated by Dr. Hoff and generated \$1,700.00 for the historical society.
- The SCHS has been getting great assistance from the alternative school students with cleaning and upkeep.

Web Site Use and Telephone Contact

The historical society receives many phone calls and numerous referrals from the city clerk's office and library relating to people searching for family or historical information. During the past year the web site: (seymourhistory.org) received 4,118 hits.

Currently the Web site has over 1,500 pictures in the Image Gallery. All past newsletters and historical articles are in the archive section of the site. The site also includes a virtual tour of the museum and thirty pictures of the various exhibits.

Title: Goetz Triplets - Category: People - Number: 18 of 508. Then provide as much accurate information as possible. Such as this: "Triplets were born to Peter and Theresa (Dilger) Goetz of rural Seymour, on February 5, 1915. Theresa was not expecting triplets, but when she had to walk through the doorway sideways, everyone kept telling her she was going to have twins.

First, there was a girl named Leone 2½pounds, then another girl named Lorraine 2 ½pounds, and last a boy named Lucius. The doctor said, `Lucius was a gentleman and let the ladies go first.' The doctor said the delivery was free. The triplets were kept near the wood stove to keep them warm. They had no hospital care or special equipment. Tender loving care kept the babies alive and healthy."

By participating in this activity you will assist the society in providing more details about Seymour pictures that are available to interested parties throughout the nation. To find a specific picture use the search tool provided in the Image Gallery.

The Reese Dairy picture is another example of the value of identifying pictures for the present and future generations. Many visitors to the museum recall Reese's Dairy as the social hub for high school students during the 1950s and early 60s.

Museum Plans for the Summer

May – Muehl Public Library

In May the museum will help the Muehl Public Library celebrate twenty years in the new building. The display at the museum will emphasize the changes that have taken place in the last twenty years. An early history of the library will also be included.

In 1901 four Seymour women collected books and started a lending library out of a house on Main Street. Eventually the library found a home in two rooms above the Seymour State Bank. When the city hall opened on Main Street in 1906, the library was moved into two rooms upstairs. It remained there until 1955. At that time the Harvey Muehl family donated cash and securities to the city that were used to purchase a brick house on the southeast corner of Main and Factory Streets. It operated in that location until the present building opened in 1994.

June – Wedding Display

The museum has an impressive wedding exhibit with a large photo of the inside of St. John's Church from the 1960s. Also included is the communion railing from the Methodist Church and a seat from the Lutheran Church. A large picture of the wedding of Robert Kuehne and Ella Wagner from May of 1899 is indicative of a typical rural reception around the turn of the century.

July – Stock Car Exhibit

Recently Ron Hassemer stopped at the museum and explained about his father, Harvey Hassemer, who raced at the Seymour Fairgrounds in the 1950s and 1960s. Since he used to travel with his dad from track to track, he developed a keen interest in stock car racing. Ron constructed a large 6' by 19' model of a vintage racetrack complete with over 60 authentic model cars. This will be a fun exhibit for the month of July. Ron wrote the following description of stock car racing during the 1950s and 60s.

"Those were the days... Drivers brought their stock cars to the track towing them with the family car or truck. They raced the same stock car on dirt tracks throughout the 1950s and early 1960s at county fairgrounds in Manitowoc, De

Pere Luxemburg, Seymour, Shawano, Plymouth, Chilton, and Oshkosh and at the Outagamie, Shiocton, Simmets, and 141 Speedway to name a few.

There was only one division of racing. Time trials consisted of two laps, one lap at a time, so drivers could adjust their cars to make them faster for the next timed lap. The cars that timed the fastest would be required to start in the back of the pack and race their way to the front, which made it exciting not only for the drivers, but also for the spectators. There were four ten lap races, a 15 lap semi-feature, and a 25 lap feature.

Some nights more than 60 cars would show up, so there would also be a consolation race for non-winners to earn some tow money. Fifty per cent of the gate went to race winners. They would also receive a checkered flag, and during the county fair, or mid-season get a trophy. At some tracks the first rollover would get a case of beer. The cars were mostly coupes with a few sedans. Parts were usually found at junk yards, and the tires were regular street tires ($6/70 \times 15''$), and the cars burned regular gasoline. Frequently after the races, drivers and fans would stop at local bars for free lunches of raw beef, onions, and cheese and crackers."

August – Burger Fest

On August 8th and 9th Seymour will celebrate the 26th annual Burger Fest with theme "Reflections of Hamburger Charlie." The event will feature a look back to 1885 when Charlie first came to the Seymour Fair in an ox cart. The tradition continued for 66 years. Numerous visitors to the museum recall eating one of Charlie's tasty burgers.

During August, the entire collection of Jeffery Tennyson will be on display in the second floor exhibit area. The collection was donated to the Seymour Museum by Monte Greges in memory of Mr. Tennyson. Tennyson is the author of the book **Hamburger Heaven**. The books are available for purchase at the gift shop in the museum. August is a great time to visit the museum and see the entire burger collection.



The entire collection will be displayed during August.

Music in the Park

John and Lynn Koenigs are busy lining up bands for the Music in the Park program for this summer. Music will start on Wednesday evening, June 18 and continue for eleven dates through August. The concerts, starting at 6:30 are sponsored by area businesses and organized by members of the historical society. New Displays at the Museum

Seymour Flying Club

Volunteers at the museum are busy adding to present exhibits, constructing new displays, and preparing new temporary exhibits for the summer. The southwest wall of the museum will portray the activities of the "Seymour Flying Club, Inc." During the spring of 1947 a group of Seymour citizens met at Hotel Nelson (Hotel Seymour) and agreed to form the club. The Board of Directors included Derbert Coonen, Orville Marnocha, Stewart Droeger



Board of Directors included Derbert Coonen, Orville Marnocha, Stewart Droeger and Harold Maass. Officers elected were: Bud Nelson, president, Jarvis N. Selberg, vice-president, and Marvin R. Kuehne secretary-treasurer. Land was purchased two miles east and two miles south of the city. Numerous notices appeared in the paper during the summer of 1948 appealing to local residents to help clear brush and trees, pick stones, and help construct a 2,600-foot runway. Plans were also underway to construct several hangers. The exhibit will include a propeller, a large aerial view of the fairgrounds, pictures of the members and a plaque recognizing high school flying club scholarship winners.

Historic Churches

Seven pictures of Seymour area historic churches constructed around the turn of the century have been added to the religious display on the second floor. The churches include Emmanuel Evangelical Lutheran Church located at the SW corner of Pearl and Main Streets, Zion Evangelical Church at the SE Corner of

Ivory and High Streets, St. Paul's Methodist Church at the SE corner of Main and High Streets, the Congregational Church on North Main Street, St. John the Baptist Catholic Church on South Main Street, Immanuel Lutheran Church, Cicero and St. Sebastian's Catholic Church in Isaar. Future plans include adding a brief history of each church.

Music and Band Display

Former Seymour High School Band Director Mike Keyzers continues to upgrade the music and band display located in the northeast section of the building. Contact Mike if you have any band instruments that you would like

to donate to the display at the museum. Presently he is compiling a list of the high school band directors and adding their pictures to the exhibit.

Prior to the 1920s music instruction was mostly individualized, and then Leland Forrest took over and formalized the program from 1926 to 1931. E. T. Hawkins (1931-42) was responsible for building the program to the point where the high school band was a featured attraction at the Outagamie County Fair. Milton Patchett was the leader during the war years from 1942-46. He was succeeded by Elwood Bleick for one year and then Leon Flanagan took over for the next 17 (1946 - 63).Flanagan was a popular personality who also played in the Ray Reis Band.

Allen Butcher led the band from 1963 to 1969. Lawrence Osterburg (1969-71) and William Land (1971-73 had brief tenures. Mike

Keyzers took over in 1973 and served as band director for 35 years until 2008. Mike now serves on the Board of Directors of the Historical Society and is the host for Music in the Park. Ryan Alben succeeded Mike and continues to lead the high school band program.

Seymour in 1931

Recently the SCHS acquired a number of issues of The Seymour Press dating back to the early 1900s. What was going on in Seymour 83 years ago? The issue from May 7, 1931 provides the reader with considerable insight.

The Prom

The juniors have been working day and night preparing for the Prom. It promises to be the biggest and best Prom ever. The date is May 7th with Tom Temple and his orchestra providing the music. The price is \$1.50 per couple including a free coat checkroom. Free punch will be served. Only couples will be admitted. Remember, young gentlemen not wearing ties will not be admitted.

Track and Field Champions

It has been another exciting season for the track team. Coming off a big win over Hortonville the boys are poised to win their second straight District title in Appleton. Last year the local team came through and won the title with 48 points. Most of last year's team is back and working hard in an effort to get into perfect condition, in order to bring the laurels of victory home again.

The point winners returning are captain Art Koepp in the sprints, shot put, and broad jump, Roger Rusch in the 440, pole vault, 220 low hurdles and the one-half mile relay, Billy Piehl will run the 120 high hurdles, low hurdles and high jump. Alfred Pauls and Carlton Ziesemer return in the mile and 880. Ray Hallada returns in the high jump and low hurdles. Also showing good form in their respective events are Robert Wolk,

Each coach is allowed to put four names on the entry blank for each event, but he must cross out two of the names the day of the meet as each school may have only two competitors in each event. Another rule is that no entrant can enter in more than three events. Last week Koepp, the team captain, set a new record in the broad jump with a leap of 19 feet 6 inches. Rusch holds the 440 record at 55.9 and Huettl and Piehl have both jumped 5 feet 6 inches. *The Seymour team won the District title at Appleton with 72 points over a second place Valders team that totaled 30. They ended up third in the state meet at Madison.*

Seymour Second in Little Nine Forensics

Wrightstown nosed out Seymour by one point to capture first place and the championship cup. Seymour had five

contestants in the finals with four of them placing. In the extemporaneous reading competition, Rogene Falck won third place. In the speaking contest Lester Krahn won first place and Norman Miller second. In the declamatory contest Wilamine Ward made a remarkable comeback to capture second. The coaches of forensics in Seymour High School are Miss Iva Shaw and John Dennigan. This program closes a very complete program of forensic work in the school. Letters will be awarded to all school and class representatives at the class night exercise.



Street Lights

The "Way Back When" section of the 1931 paper included an article about the early streetlamps and the lamplighter Fred Wolk. Of course this was before the use of electricity to light up the city. The oil-burning lamp described in the article is visible in the picture of the Dean and Lorenz Hardware Store. The lamp is on display in the Old General Store next to the museum.



During the early 1900s city streets were lighted by oil burning lamps mounted on eight-foot posts. A lamppost was located at practically every prominent street corner in the city. Many of the older residents of the city can recall hearing the merry whistled tunes of Fred Wolk as he, with his faithful white horse without saddle or bridle, made the rounds each night at dusk lighting the street It was a common yet lamps. interesting sight to see this white horse gallop up to and stop at the side of a lamppost close enough to enable its rider to open the door of the lamp, clean the chimney and light the wick while standing upright on the horse's back.


Short Local News from 1931



Ziegenbein Photos from 1914

In 1914 only three people in Seymour had cameras and they made it a practice to take pictures of a variety of events. One of these was individuals was Chester Ziegenbein. Fortunately, his daughter Mary Fiestadt and her husband Cliff are great friends of the museum. They have donated numerous items and shared their photo collection. 




This view looking north on Main Street shows the smoke generated by the locomotive as it pulled away from the depot. Notice how the school, city hall, and Seymour Hotel dominated the landscape. Businesses visible on the east side of Main Street include Feurig Hardware, Becker's Home Bakery and Hallada's Meat Market.



This is a picture of the excavation of the foundation for the Emmanuel Lutheran Church on northwest Main Street. It clearly indicates how horses were used to pull a large bucket that removed the earth. Notice the men with shovels getting ready to take on the backbreaking work.



These once impressive structures were razed many years ago. The water tank was essential for the steam powered locomotives and the grain elevator is a tribute to Seymour's agricultural past.
